

Another Massacre-Letters from Grant and Sherman. JUNCTION CITY, Kansas, Feb. 2. A man came into Salina, about fifty miles West from here, yesterday, and reported that another frightful massacro of white men by the Cheyenne Indians had occurred near the head of Smoky Hill River a few days since, under

another frightful massacro of white men by the Cheyenne Indians had occurred near the head of Smoky Hill River a few days since, under the following circumstances:

Wallace's train, with sixty men, were in camp, when a party of fourteen Indians came begging of the teamsters, who refused to give them anything. The Indians then fired upon them without any effect; the teamsters returning the fire, killed eight of the aggressors.

About eight o'clock that night the camp was surrounded by some 200 Indians, who massacred 50 out of 63 men. The man who brought the news had an arrow-head through his shoulder, and was also wounded in the hip. He claims to be one of the four men who escaped.

OFFICIAL REIORTS ANY COMPLAINTS.

Secretary Stanton has transmitted to the Senate the telegrams and other official communications relative to the massacre of United States troops by Indians on the 21st of December lest, near Fort Phil. Kearney, in Dakotah. On the 18th of January General Sherman forwarded to General Grant an extract from a private letter received at his office from a sergent at the fort, describing the horrors of the massacre. It represents that no one escaped; "all were butchered and scalped, their bodies stripped and chopped with knives and tomahawks, stripped of every article of dress, and shot through and through with arrows "The writer complains of the conduct of the Indian Shot through and through with arrows "The writer complains of the conduct of the Indian Rommissioners, and says that they are furnishing the Indians with guns and ammunition to hunn with, and they are using them to murder white men. The official report estimates the number of Indians attacking the massacred party at three thousand.

LETTER FROM GENERAL SHERMAN.

General Sherman. General Grant says the letter shows the urgent necessity for an immediate transfer of the Indian Bureau to the War and Department, and the abolition of the Civil Indian Agents and licensed traders. "If," le says, "the present practice is to be continued, I do not see t

"The course General Sherman has pursued in this matter in disregarding the permit of Mr. Bogy and others, is just right. I will instruct him to enforce his order until it is countermanded by the President or yourself. I would respectfully ask that this matter be placed before the President and his disapproval of icensing the sale of arms to Indians be asked. We have treaties with all the tribes of Indians from time to time. If the rule is to be followed that all the tribes with which we have treaties and pay annutities, can procure such articles without stint or limit, it will not be long before the matter becomes perfectly understood by the Indians, and they will avail themselves of it to equip perfectly for war. They will get the arms either by making treaties themselves or through tribes who have such treaties."

General Shermau's letter is dated January 21 last, and addressed to General Hancock commanding the military division of the Missouri, in which he says: "We, the military, are held responsible for the peace of the frontier, and it is an absurdity to attempt it if Indian Agents and Traders can legalize and encourage so dangerous a traffic. I regard the inclosed paper, addressed to Mr. D. A. Butterfield and signed by Charles Bogy, W. R. Irwin, J. H. Leavenworth, and others, as an outrage upon our rights and supervision of the matter, and now authorize you to disregard that paper, and at once stop the practice. If the Indian agents may be without limit, supply the Indians with arms, I would not expose our troops and trains to them at all, but would withdraw our soldiers, who have already a Herculean isak on their hands." The order signed by Charles Bogy and others, and addressed to hir. Butterfield, is as follows:

Sh. You having requised verbally to be informed in regard to your right to sell arms and ammunition to in distribution to any Indians that are at peace with, and arctiving ammunite from, the Usited States Government, are authorized to sell or trade arms and amtunition to any Indians that are at peace with, and receiving ammunities from, the Usited States Government. This rule, of course, applies to any other regularly incorred trader, as well as yourself.
